A Monument to Christ's Willingness to Answer Prayer

In the late 1800's, Martin Wells Knapp, Methodist evangelist and founding editor of *God's Revivalist*, felt that God was going to use him for more than just the publishing work in which he was then engaged. His diary entry for July 17, 1890, reads as follows:

A training school for gospel workers is on my heart and in my head. It seems as if God put it there. I agreed tonight that if He will give me the building for the Home, to use it for His glory and to put this or a similar statement on it: "This building is a monument of the power and willingness of the loving Christ to answer prayer."

That prayer became a reality in 1900 when Knapp bought property at 1810 Young Street, Cincinnati. The red-brick mansion, which is still the administrative center for GBS, was filled to capacity when classes began on September 27. Few if any could have envisioned what God would do on this campus in the century ahead. God's Bible School and Missionary Training Home was to give life to a number of notable religious organizations, provide a home for the Revivalist Press, host one of the largest camp meetings in the Midwest, and send a steady line of courageous and dedicated graduates to so many places at home and abroad that the alumni motto would become "The Sun Never Sets on the Graduates of God's Bible School."

Throughout this century on the Hilltop, GBS and *God's Revivalist* have been united in a happy marriage which has blessed the world. Knapp founded the periodical twelve years before the school and used the former to create the latter. Probably there would have been no GBS without the *Revivalist*; and probably there would be no *Revivalist* now without GBS. Both are the result of Knapp's genius and sacrifice, and both still bear his imprint. Together they have made the Mount of Blessings the vital holiness center which it has been and which it still remains. In God's kindly providence, they will continue to do the same in the years before us.

It is therefore appropriate that this special commemorative issue for the GBS Centenary appear in the very pages which helped give birth to the school one hundred years ago. Obviously we have encapsulated the century past with only the briefest summary. We hope our readers will seek more exhaustive treatment in the two official histories now in preparation—one a rich pictorial presentation with accompanying verbal vignettes; and the other, a scholarly, interpretive narrative.

The history of this venerated institution has demonstrated that Knapp's prayer has been answered again and again. After a century on its Mt. Auburn campus, God's Bible School still remains a "monument of the power and willingness of the loving Christ to answer prayer."

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God's Revivalist and Bible Advocate, the official organ of God's Bible School, is a magazine founded by Martin Wells Knapp in July of 1888. We seek to proclaim the good news of salvation; to stir a revival spirit among Christians; to stimulate Christian growth and responsible Christian living; to present the happenings and interests of God's Bible School.

SMALL IN STATURE; LARGE IN LOVE

Martin Wells Knapp was a man small in stature but large in love," wrote famous evangelist Joseph H. Smith. "He was zeal incarnate. His whole being, physical and mental, was spent to feed the flame of love's fires that burned in his heart for souls, for holiness, for God's people, and for God Himself." For a decade Knapp had served as a Methodist pastor before becoming a highly effective evangelist. He was also known for several books which he had written; and in 1888 he began *The Revivalist*, a monthly periodical which soon became an influential voice in the flourishing holiness movement.

In 1892, he moved to Cincinnati, where he reestablished his publishing ministry and began an inner-city holiness mission. In association with the Quaker evangelist Seth C. Rees, he founded the International Holiness Union and Prayer League, which later became the foundation for the Pilgrim Holiness Church. For several years he had felt the need of a "Bible Training School for gospel workers"; and in the summer of 1900 he purchased two houses on a two-acre plot for this purpose at the corner of Young and Channing Streets on Mt. Auburn. God's Bible School opened September 27 with 72 students and a faculty of four. Subjects taught that first year included Bible, grammar, orthography, penmanship, and music.

His administration was brief, for on December 7, 1901, he died at the age of 48. But his Methodist heart had set the school's priorities—holiness commitment, evangelical experience, disciplined piety, and global evangelism. William and Mabel Hirst, the first of thousands to leave GBS for the mission field, embarked for Africa on May 10, 1900; and weeks later, Charles and Lettie Cowman left the campus to begin the great work of the Oriental Missionary Society in Japan. Campus improvements included a dining hall addition to the Administration Building, and the erection of "God's Tabernacle," a wooden structure housing the campus chapel and men's dormitory.

THREE WOMEN RULE THE MOUNT OF BLESSINGS

Just before his death, Martin Wells Knapp appointed a triumvirate of women to succeed him in directing God's Bible School. These administrative trustees were Minnie Ferle Knapp, his wife; Bessie Queen, his secretary and assistant; and Mary Storey, a Methodist evangelist and businesswoman. The Rev. M.G. Standley, another of his colleagues, assumed a pastoral and supporting role. In 1902, Standley married Bessie Queen; and upon Mrs. Storey's death in 1906, he was added to the Board of Trustees.

During the period of the administrative trustees, there was both conflict and growth. Since Knapp had left the school "to God" in his will, there was uncertainty as to who its earthly owners were; and litigation ensued. In 1907, the Court of Common Pleas, Hamilton County, Ohio, ruled that hereafter GBS would be "a public charitable trust" under jurisdiction of the court. This arrangement would last until 1982.

In 1902, a five-story brick structure was erected on the southeast corner of the campus. Known later as "the Ten Weeks Building," this housed the engine room for the production of electricity, a laundry, offices, book room, dining hall and kitchen, and housing for women students. In the same year, Hope Cottage, a home for unwed mothers, was established in an old mansion on Young Street. Two years later, equipment was purchased and placed in the wooden tabernacle for the publication of *God's Revivalist* and other campus publications formerly printed offcampus. In 1906 "God's Orphanage" was opened in a 13-room house near Mulberry, Ohio.

In 1907, Oswald Chambers, known later for his classic devotional writing *My Utmost for His Highest*, visited GBS and remained for six months as a member of the faculty. Even after his work took him out of the country, he returned to speak at camp meetings on the Hilltop. He also contributed many articles to *God's Revivalist*.

GBS continued its vigorous holiness evangelism and missionary outreach, while emphasizing social ministries in Cincinnati. Both students and faculty were involved in street meetings, house-to-house visitation, inner-city missions, and "rescue work" in the miserable slums of Shanty Town.

<u>M.G. Standley</u> 1911–1950

STRONG, AGGRESSIVE LEADERSHIP

The appointment of Brother Standley commenced 39 years of strong, aggressive presidential leadership," *Revivalist* editor Glenn Black once wrote. "M.G. Standley was not only a man of vision; he also knew how to implement his ideas. He believed in outreach to the spiritually lost and physically needy." During his vigorous and creative administration, GBS realized much of its founder's vision and became a flourishing focal point for the entire holiness movement.

He supervised the erection of two major buildings which are still centers of campus life—the Revivalist Memorial Building, containing the women's dormitory and the Revivalist Press, and now the elementary academy; and the Knapp Memorial Building, housing the chapel, high school, and men's dormitory. The campus was expanded to a full six acres; and in March 1930, GBS became a pioneer in Christian radio broadcasting with its "Sunrise Worship Hour" over WKRC in Cincinnati.

Other ministries included the massive Thanksgiving Day dinners, begun in 1901, which now became a widely-recognized social ministry attended by over 20,000 inner-city poor during the Great Depression. Evangelists such as Joseph H. Smith, "Uncle Buddie" Robinson, and the Fleming brothers brought attention to the camp meetings, which attracted thousands to the Hilltop. Circulation of *God's Revivalist* grew to an all-time high of 54,000.

During this period the high school was established and later accredited. The "Bible school" really became a college, and in 1936 the Ohio State Board of Education authorized it to grant both the ThB and the BA degrees. Students wishing a short, concentrated preparation for personal evangelism could enroll in the Ten Weeks Course. Culminating the Standley administration was the GI's of the Cross crusade, opening at a massive inner-city revival at Cincinnati's Music Hall in November 1946. This began three years of jeepand-trailer evangelism across much of the U.S. and into foreign countries.

As President Samuel E. Deets declared in a 1969 *Revivalist* article, M.G. Standley was "the man whom God used to build this Bible school into a world-renowned organization with spiritual influence far out of proportion to its size." During the (p10)







→ (p9) final years of his administration, however, there was a troubling lack of financial responsibility; and his advancing years only added to his vulnerability. "By that time, M.G. Standley was seventy years old and older," Dr. Deets added; "and...his leadership was a spiritual one so that there were those close to him who took advantage of this fact and spent his school into a nearly fatal indebtedness." The ensuing tragedy brought dark days to GBS, but it did not obscure the massive contribution which M.G. Standley made in his half century upon the Hilltop. His death came on May 13, 1962. ►

In March GBS begins broadcasting its "Sunrise Worship Service" over Radio Station WKRC at 6:45 a.m. Speaker is President Standley, and singing is by the GBS Radio Chorus.

The Great Depression brings approximately 23,000 to the Thanksgiving Day feast, which costs an estimated nine thousand dollars.

1936 Ohio State Board of Education authorizes GBS to grant the ThB and the BA degrees. In announcing the "Service of Thanksgiving" to mark the occasion, the *Cincinnati Post* states that GBS "is known as the stronghold of the fundamental faith in the Middle West."

1937 GBS staff and students share in rescue and relief operations during the great Ohio River flood in January.

1938 In spite of harsh winter weather, some 21,000 attend Thanks-







Lloyd R. Day 1950–1961



THE BOAT DID NOT SINK

Beloved, there is no reason why the school cannot go forward," insisted Lloyd Day in *God's Revivalist*, January 26, 1950. "I saw it like a boat almost filled with water and ready to sink; but the Lord said, 'Peace, be still,' and there was a great calm." Then in his mid-forties, the former GBS high school principal had just been appointed president; and his vision of the perils which he faced was starkly realistic. Yet the school did go forward, and the boat did not sink.

President Bence C. Miller put it succinctly many years later. "As former students know so well, when L.R. Day was asked to assume the responsibilities of president, clouds of disaster hung over God's Bible School. Debts totaling over one million dollars were owed by the school....Friends, associates and ministers withdrew and, if not in words, certainly in actions, predicted ruin..."

Almost immediately the new president launched a massive campaign to "save the school." In full cooperation with Business Manager Allen Roudebush and the court-appointed Board of Trustees, he raised thousands of dollars through cash donations and debt cancellations to erase the staggering debt and lead the school back to credibility. Rev. and Mrs. E.G. Marsh, Alice "Mom" White, and Nettie Peabody rallied the staff and faculty, directed their prayers toward Heaven, and joined others in stirring appeals in the *Revivalist*.

Little by little, the tide began to turn; and through the sacrifice of friends and alumni, God's Bible School was saved from liquidation. From respected professionals to remote housewives, there are many heroes in this sad chapter in the school's history; and among them is its third president—Lloyd R. Day. He died in 1979.





Elmer G. Marsh 1961–1965

GOD'S CLOCK KEEPS PERFECT TIME!

God's clock keeps perfect time!" GBS alumni still remember this oft-repeated motto of the Rev. Elmer Marsh, who came to the presidency of the school in the summer of 1961. At that time, he had already given nearly fifty years to his alma mater and was widely honored throughout the holiness movement. Dearly loved by hundreds of students who had sat under his teachings, his sturdy, gentle piety and his lifetime commitment to GBS has placed his name among the most cherished in its history.

At the time of the school's brush with financial catastrophe, he assumed a crucial role. "For it was E.G. Marsh who, when the clouds of despair were hanging lowest, took on himself very large portions of responsibility that had been laid down by others...," former President Samuel E. Deets has remarked. "He traveled tens of thousands of miles, week in and week out, in his never-ceasing efforts to maintain rapport between God's Bible School and its creditors. Buffeted on every side, it cannot be remembered that he ever succumbed to bitterness or self-pity."

He was already in his eighties when he became the school's fourth president. "Part of his work was successfully dealing with investors; part of it was gaining and maintaining the confidence of the court-appointed trustees of the school," recalls Kenneth Stetler, who was then on the faculty. "He was a stabilizing force among the faculty because of his prayer life and simple faith that God would supply all our needs."

Undoubtedly it was the force of Marsh's personal character which was his greatest contribution. At his retirement he was made "president emeritus," a title which he carried until his death in 1972.

REBUILDING AND RENEWAL

President Deets, I would be remiss if I did not thank you for the decade of unstinted love and labor you have lavished upon your Alma Mater. As its talented administrator, your well-crafted course of action has brought it out of chaos to this momentous hour. You have launched the school on our campus renewal program, represented most graphically today by the sounds of construction coming from the new building site." This was the tribute which Byron J. Crouse, head of the Board of Trustees, offered at chapel services, May 8, 1975, to Dr. Samuel E. Deets, who a few weeks later would leave the GBS presidency.

Deets had not been quite 31 years of age when he had assumed that office in May 1965. With vision and purpose he approached the challenges which awaited him. GBS still reeled from crushing debt, its aged buildings crumbled from neglect; and its future seemed uncertain. His desire was to see the Hilltop restored to its former position of spiritual influence. "I am convinced," he said, "of the ability and the willingness of the God of God's Bible School to make it once more the genuinely interdenominational lighthouse of the holiness movement in this country. He will indeed resurrect the school to new life. As president of this school, I shall spare no effort, no amount of time, and no amount of interest to see that this becomes a reality."

Dr. Deets' academic insight, tireless energy, and practical "hands-on" approach made his tenure a period of vigorous activity, focused on rebuilding and renewal. A highlight of his administration was the great "Jubilee" camp meeting service, June 8, 1969, celebrating the elimination of the school's gigantic debt. President Deets also launched a major effort to rejuvenate the long-neglected campus; and in March 1975 ground was broken for the new student activities building.

School finances grew, and many new properties were added to the campus.

After ten years, he announced that "the time has come when from the need for a less hectic schedule, I must withdraw from the point of pressure....As I reflect on the past ten years, I'd do it again. God's Bible School had—and has—a lot of catching up to do. What happened was that God took a faulty human instrument when none other was available and used it for the purpose for which it was born."

VIGOROUS SERVICE AT GOD'S BIBLE SCHOOL

M y intentions are never to shirk the responsibilities, no matter how great, and to make any sacrifice to see the work of God prosper here and become fully established. I solicit your prayers as the school's new president. It is *God's* Bible School; and because of this fact, we His servants must work to guarantee its prosperity in the years to come."

With these words in its issue of June 26, 1975, Bence C. Miller greeted the readers of *God's Revivalist*. His reputation as a "self-starter" and a "man of great dynamism who wants to see things go forward" was well-established, and he had just been elected as sixth president of GBS. Certainly his experience in building up five struggling pastorates and his work in drafting, engineering, and construction had uniquely prepared him for the challenges which he would face for twenty years on the Hilltop.

He vigorously continued the renewal of the campus with extensive renovation of existing structures; the completion of the student center, which is now named in his honor; and the construction of the R.G. Flexon Memorial Library. President Miller also established the K-8 GBS elementary academy, housed on the beautifully remodeled first level of the Revivalist Memorial building. Other properties became a part of the Mt. Auburn campus, and GBS established a missionary outreach in Belize, Central America.

During the Miller administration, the Hamilton, County, Court of Common Pleas freed the school from judicial supervision in 1982. For the first time since 1907, the school was free to chart its own destiny. Four years later, GBS received full accreditation status by the Accrediting Association of Bible Colleges (AABC). This added new stature to the credibility of the school's academic program.

Because he was convinced that GBS was *God's* Bible school, Bence C. Miller gave twenty years of forceful leadership on the Hilltop. As he came to the end of his presidency, he wrote, "I agree with R. G. Flexon when he said there is not another school like it in the world. It is still *God's* Bible school, and it is one of a kind!"

REVERENCE FOR YESTERDAY; VISION FOR TOMORROW

June 4, 1995, was Pentecost Sunday; and hundreds of GBS's sons and daughters had squeezed into the creaking, operastyle seats screwed to the chapel floor. This was a high, holy day upon the Mount of Blessings—a festive time of family homecoming and celebration. Michael R. Avery, 1979 GBS alumnus, Alabama pastor, and missionary executive, was about to become seventh president of God's Bible School.

His inaugural address set the tone for his administration reverence for yesterday; vision for tomorrow! He reviewed GBS's "colorful and dramatic past—a holiness and missionary heritage that is unusually rich and extremely important to both this country, as well as others," and pledged loyalty to its principles. "I will not betray the trust of the great saints who have loved this school and given dearly to keep it true to the Word of God."

Courageously he addressed the future. "We have many exciting plans," he declared, "but we are fully aware of the problems that loom before us." Frankly he acknowledged "significant problems," such as the school's declining enrollment and its "financial quagmire" of indebtedness. With God's help, he promised to "tackle what appears to be insurmountable burdens," and at the same time committed himself to such priorities as faculty enrichment, academic upgrading, and disciplined campus life.

Five years later, morale is high! Under President Avery's leadership, financial stability is evident, enrollment figures are rising, and campus renewal continues on the Hilltop. The campus chapel has been thoroughly renovated, air-conditioned, and dedicated to the memory of the Rev. J. Wesley Adcock. Major remodeling has occurred in the Revivalist Memorial Building, and an elevator and a new heating system have been installed.

Faculty housing has also received major attention, and a fountain and new landscaping have been added. In 1996 the H.E. Schmul Ministerial and Research Center was opened with appropriate ceremonies. In addition to a small chapel, this features the personal library of Methodist/holiness books which H.E. Schmul had personally presented to the school.

Even more important is the renewed sense of ministry, as students and faculty share the president's undivided commitment to Christian service. GBS is unique in its strategic (p26)




