



Celebration on the Hilltop

Centenary! According to the bulky unabridged dictionary open beside my desk, this is a synonym for centennial, which, in turn, is defined as a "100th anniversary or celebration." Such an event would not be kept in heaven, where time is enveloped by eternity. On earth, however, years are duly counted; and 100 of them bridge a momentous span, especially when that span constitutes the entire life of a small American Bible college. For good reason, then, both high festivity and solemn recollection marked God's Bible School's centenary celebration, September 27–30. For these enchanted days, GBS's sons and daughters joined in the greatest homecoming which they probably shall ever know before their final one in glory.

"Our fair Alma Mater, O strengthen her days To send forth forever true sons to her praise." On Founder's Day, we sang these words of a noble hymn as our earnest prayer for GBS. "Alma mater," an old Latin term meaning "mother dear," refers, of course, to the school where one was once a student. It was to their alma mater that those hundreds of singing alumni had returned to acknowledge the immeasurable debt they owed her for the immeasurable treasure she had given them. This they did gratefully in their focus on heritage, community, and destiny.

Heritage. Pathos tugged at many hearts and tears welled in many eyes as a century of heroic service appeared before us in splendid panorama. Such hallowed names as Knapp, Godbey, Rees, Chambers, Cowman, Standley, Peabody, White, and Marsh were recalled with gratitude. Such historic chapters as George Street Mission, Hope Cottage, the Thanksgiving Dinners, Salvation Park Camp Meetings, and the GI's of the Cross Crusade were revisited with fascination. Deep roots remain at GBS, and we praised the God who planted them.

Community. "Wherever you are, wherever you have gone, whatever you have become, it's time to come back home!" This was President Avery's welcome; and in response, the family did come trooping home—laughing, hugging, chattering, praying, and reveling in the school's evident renewal. Old grads were back for the first time in years—perhaps some for the first time since they were handed their diplomas. Denominational divisions were set aside, as warm Christian brotherhood led to a campus lovefeast reminiscent of GBS's early years.

Destiny. Gripping the Hilltop during those autumn days was a refreshing sense of courage, grace, and purpose for the realities of tomorrow. The past is rich; and it was richly commemorated. But to adapt Wes Tracy's words, heritage must be a "sign post" to the century ahead, not a "hitching post" to the century past. Core convictions must never change, but means and methods must; and the festivities on the Mount of Blessings were an open gateway into our future.

In the photographs and narrative on these pages, we invite you to share the excitement of those festivities. This is the second of our centenary commemorative issues; but it will not conclude our special coverage, for the anniversary year continues through camp meeting 2001. We shall not be here, of course, for such celebration when GBS's next centenary rolls around; but in heaven, where time is enveloped by eternity, we shall give God praise for a small American Bible college which is the alma mater of so many who shall have gathered there. "O widen her borders, extend her fair fame, And let all the glory redound to Thy name."

THE GRAND CONVOCATION

WEDNESDAY, 9:45 AM

"Immortal, invisible, God only wise, In light inaccessible, hid from our eyes." Autumn sunlight glittered through the chapel's Gothic chancel windows, as hundreds of voices blended in the soaring 19th-century hymn. By the clock high on the east wall, it was nearly 10:00 A.M.; and Board President Leonard Sankey had

just welcomed us to the opening Founder's Day convocation. Exactly 100 years before, as he reminded us, GBS had begun "its fascinating and spiritually-invigorating saga of faith, prayer, and miracle." This was a time for splendid ceremony and solemn commemoration; and the morning was to be filled with both.

As the organ pealed out the tones of Bellini's Grande March in B Flat Major, President Michael Avery and the faculty robed, hooded, and tasseled in full academic regalia—had marched down the aisle in colorful procession; and with them were distinguished guests who would partici-

pate in the service. Edsel Trouten, GBS alumnus and now its campus pastor, had then prayed that God would "give such an awareness of Your mercies that with a truly thankful heart, we may show forth Your praise."

For months the campus had been primped, preened, and polished for this moment. Manicured

lawns and sculpted shrubs were accented by showy displays of chrysanthemums of every color planted by the buildings, near the street signs, and in the happy little park with its bubbling, splashing fountain. On the buildings (p4)



ily home; and stretched from utility poles across Young and Channing Streets, other banners did the same. Inside the chapel, gleaming from its recent renovations, the walls were hung with massive grapevine wreaths, adorned with pink and lavender flowers and trimmed with bows of gold. Before the walnut pulpit and at the

platform's either end, gladioluses perfumed the air with tall spikes of pink and white blossoms in the shape of funnels.

Thus the setting was spectacular, as it should have been for this once-in-a-lifetime occasion. Impressive, too, were the guests who had honored us by their presence. Speaking from the government and business community were Ms. Jana Widmeyer for Sen. Mike DeWine, Mr. Phil Heimlich for the mayor and city council of Cincinnati, and Dr. Lawra Baumann for the Fifth Third Foundation. Greetings were also brought from Ohio Governor Robert Taft. From academic circles were Dr. Barbara Stonewater, the Greater Cincinnati Consortium of Colleges and Universities; Dr. Randy Bell, the AABC; and the Rev. man, Interchurch Holiness Convention: Gen. Paul A Rader, the Salvation Army; and Dr. H. E. Schmul, Jr., The United Methodist Church.

As always when Garen Wolf waves his baton, the choir and orchestra were superlative! How those boys in charcoal gray suits and those girls in teal dresses sang out their hearts for Jesus and for their school! "Give thanks with a grateful heart," they urged, then added the sublime strains of "Rejoice Ye Pure in Heart" and the melting words of "The Love of God." Sarah Wolf rose literally and metaphorically to lofty heights in her exquisite solo.

To President Avery, Larry D. Smith and Kevin Moser presented the school's fascinating new pictorial history, God's Clock Keeps Perfect Time, which they had authored and compiled. Wesley Humble followed with a similar presentation of A Charge to Keep, the video of historic GBS film footage which he had produced. Then with both grace and dignity, Dr. Wingrove Taylor, GBS's "favorite son," arose to lead us in the centenary litany prepared for this day. Earnestly we adored the Triune God, thanked Him for "Martin Wells Knapp and the other founders of this College," and committed ourselves before Him "to the Christian ideals which gave birth to God's Bible School one hundred years ago." David Fuller and accompanied by Archie Coons at the piano and Martha Miller at the organ. "Our Father in heaven, Creator of all," we chorused. "O Source of all wisdom, on Thee would we call."

In his address, Dr. Michael Avery, our president, moved us with his impassioned eloquence, urging us to "look over our shoulders" at heroic names and stirring chapters in GBS's first century of service. 






THE CENTENARY **MONUMENT**

WEDNESDAY, 12:15 PM

After the great convocation's benediction by Robert England, we edged our way out into that crisp autumn sunshine to the shrouded centenary monument near the chapel and south across the entrance ramp. Following explanatory remarks by President Avery and a dedicatory prayer by Millard Downing, the crimson drapery was pulled away; and the limestone monument stood unveiledmassive and majestic, with carved open


Bible and bronze plaques explaining the school's origin and listing distinguished contributors to its history. Richard Humble offered the benediction.

Perhaps our great-grandchildren will walk down the brick "centenary walk" with its names of donors and significant persons in our past; and they will reflect that we cared enough to carve our tribute to heritage in limestone, brick. and bronze. Even

"Old Tom," the early dray horse, is not forgotten; and his brick is near those of B.R. Lakin, the Baptist evangelist, and F. Lincicome, the Free Methodist scholar.

"To the glory of God, whose faithfulness has sustained God's Bible School through one hundred years, and in loving memory of all His servants who have labored here, this monument is humbly dedicated, Centenary Founders' Day, September 27, 2000.







Mr. Geoff Bennett, Mr. Maurice Garton, and Mr. John Wood, all from the Oswald Chambers Publication Association, Limited, London, England, then stood and received the applause of the congregation.

We were deeply moved that they had come all the way across the Atlantic to share these moments with us. Their "general manager," Mrs. J. Mary Hutchison, spoke briefly on their behalf, expressing in cultured British accents their gladness to be "where Oswald Chambers walked and where he taught." With both humor and devotion, she explained the OCPA's use of royalties from Chamber's books for such ministries as publishing projects, schools, children's homes, and Christian video distribution. She concluded by quoting Chambers: "The knowledge that God has loved me beyond all limits compels me to go to the world and love others in the same way."

David McCasland, whose recent Chambers' biography, *Abandoned to God*, is both definitive and fascinating, presented the principal address. His absorbing anecdotes, reflections, and insights into Chambers' life and ministry kept our undivided attention. He recalled Chambers coming to GBS in December 1906, his teaching on the faculty in 1907, his friendship with President and Mrs. Standley, his subsequent return to three summer GBS camp meetings, and his publication of many writings in *God's Revivalist*. "He thoroughly enjoyed being here," he noted. "He loved God's Bible School."

Now came the climactic official opening of the Oswald Chambers Room in the historic double-parlor of GBS's Administration Building. Over 90 years ago, Chambers' rich Scottish brogue echoed from these very walls; and now they enclose a memorial to his ministry. A superb collection of photographs (p15)

⇒ (p14) and other memorabilia presented by the OCPA—are displayed there, as are other appropriate items. The Jacob G. Schmidlapp Trust (Fifth Third Bank, Trustee) has generously underwritten the stunning restoration of the room, which will also be used as a conference center. After a reading from Chambers by Mr. McCasland and dedicatory prayer by Dr. Wingrove Taylor, Mrs. Hutchison cut the ceremonial ribbon and entered the room. Hundreds followed her that day; and in the years to come, hundreds more will follow. GBS is the only Ameri-

can home which Chambers ever knew; and as far is known, GBS provides the only official memorial to



THURSDAY, 7:15 PM


Theme of this evening was "The Social Conscience and Missionary Passion," and it was vividly portrayed in moving dramatic vignettes of GBS's historic outreach. Written and directed by Ben Durr, Jr., of the ministerial faculty, the presentation was set within the "frame" of a GBS history class. It focused

vividly on (1) Knapp's original vision for the school; (2) George Street Mission and the ministry to the inner-city; (2) Hope Cottage, the "rescue home" established for "fallen women"; (3) The Cowmans and the ten GBS students who helped them in the "every creature crusade" of 1917; (4) the Thanksgiving Dinners held from 1901–1961, complete with sounds of squawking turkeys and original film footage; and (5) the GI's of the





Where but at the GBS centenary would you rub shoulders with Glenn Black, John Parker, Esther Shelhamer James, Wesley Duewel, Virgil Meyer, Kenneth Stetler, Dr. and Mrs. J.B. Along with hundreds of other pilgrims to the Hilltop, they were present at one time or another during the week's festivities, all bound together in a brief but blissful camaraderie. REMEMBERING BROTHER KNAPP

FRIDAY, 10:00 AM

"It can't rain! It won't rain!" As Brother Sankey recalled during the morning service, these were the words that President Avery had used months earlier to express his view of centenary weather. Certainly the golden shafts of mellow autumn sunshine fulfilled his hope as we sat in the chapel—GBS's "Great House of Prayer"— to remember Martin Wells Knapp. After music and prayer, Dr. Avery introduced Dr. William Kostlevy, prominent church historian and director of the special collections library, Asbury Seminary, and "a dear friend of this institution."

With insight and humor, Kostlevy paid tribute to Knapp, founder of both the Revivalist and God's Bible School. In a time of social and spiritual disintegration, the fiery little Methodist evangelist issued a renewed call to radical discipleship; and in doing so, he transcended "narrow sectarian ministry," laying the foundation for a religious movement which in broad perspective now encompasses approximately 550 million people. The Asbury scholar praised the "content of the faculty" now at GBS, the "quality of the Revivalist," and the "heritage of this Hilltop"—a heritage which demonstrates that "God hovers over a people who want to follow Him...people who are different from the world around them."

President Avery followed Kostlevy's remarks with a fervent exhortation, reminding us that the early holiness movement was "utterly abandoned to bring about the Kingdom of God." Both commitment and creativity are still essential. "Whoever can pick up on the wave of what God is doing and ride that wave," he insisted will be a powerful instrument in His service.

BACK TO THE BIBLE; BACK TO PENTECOST

FRIDAY, 2:00 PM

In the afternoon, Wallace Thornton, GBS alumnus, historian, and writer, presented readings from his forthcoming book, *Back to the Bible: The Story of God's Bible School.* This will be the school's 400-page, official interpretative history, produced by the Committee on History and Archives. "Back to the Bible" has been GBS's motto from its beginning, Thornton reminded us; and to the school's founders, this meant "Back to Pentecost." Convinced that "Pentecost was being recreated on the Mount of Blessings," they focused their priorities around its fiery sanctifying power.

Thornton kept our attention with his vivid description of Knapp's arrest and conviction for "disorderly conduct," during the noisy GBS camp meeting demonstrations in 1901. He also pictured the "stewardship of time" so characteristic of early GBS scheduling—a school day with only two meals, a half hour for "social visits" and a school term of 40 weeks with no vacations—since vacations were "not Pentecostal."

HONORING PROFESSOR MCNEILL

This service concluded with the official dedication of the school's music building in memory of Robert E. McNeill, faculty member from 1901 until his death in 1937 and founder of "the Bible School Conservatory of Gospel Music." Garen Wolf, present head of the Division of Music, eulogized his predecessor for his "wellrounded" concern for both religious and classical music and emphasized that the school's present program is centered in McNeill's original priorities. After a splendid violin trio by former music division head John Envart, his son Ben, and Miss Deanna Wolf, President Avery gave tribute to McNeill's musical commitment and personal piety, and Brother Sankey offered the dedicatory prayer. Then in a particularly moving response, Susan McNeill Westhafer, a GBS alumna now in her 80's, spoke of her love for her late father, for GBS, and for Jesus. President Avery announced that the R. E. McNeill Music Hall would be open after service, and visitors could see the new oil portrait of Professor McNeill presented by the family. This, like the new Chambers portrait and that of Knapp hanging in the Administration foyer, was painted by Patsy Arrington Dorsett, Vinton, Virginia.




Alumni Convocation September 30, 2000

THE FINALE SATURDAY, 10:00 AM

Founders' Day Convocation had begun those festal days upon the Hilltop, and now Alumni Convocation brought them to an end. Standing once more before those radiant chapel windows, we chorused "Blessed Assurance" and bowed in prayer. After a duet by the

Vernons, Dennis Johnson, president of the alumni association, honored graduates from the classes of 1975 and 1950. Jewel Brock Sparks, retired GBS high school teacher, spoke as the sole representative of her own high school class of 50 years ago.

Gowned impressively in full academic regalia and assisted by Dr. Kenneth Farmer and Dr. Allan Brown, both dressed in similar fashion, President Avery now conferred the honorary degree Doctor of Divinity on Leonard Sankey ('60 ThB) and on A. Wingrove Taylor



('52 BA Mus, '52 BA, '52 ThB). As the president explained, these special centenary honors were designed for distinguished alumni who modeled the "core values" of GBS and who could be upheld as "what we want GBS students ultimately to be."

To Leonard Sankey, who has served on the GBS Board of Trustees since 1978 and has been its chairman since 1988, the president said, "You have represented your school well in the larger holiness community. At the same time you have maintained a very close involvement with your alma mater." In gracious response, Sankey recalled the standards, the prin-

ciples, and the instruction he had received on the Hilltop, remarking, "My life today is a reflection of what GBS became to me 40 to 50 years ago."

Addressing Wingrove Taylor, the president reminded him that "we endearingly refer to you as our favorite son" and declared appreciation for "your counsels, your prayers, and your admonitions." Taylor, a member of the GBS Board of Trustees since 1970, accepted the degree in honor of his parents and GBS faculty and also "in honor of God my Saviour, Father, and Friend." As Sankey and Taylor—saintly, courageous, loyal sons of GBS—stood before us in the flowing gowns of their alma mater's highest honor, we made the chapel walls echo with our applause. The families of the honorees were present to share the moment.

Dr. Taylor moved to the pulpit and delivered the "alumni challenge." Eloquently he called upon us to "express gratitude for GBS, experience the grace of GBS, (p25)
